#### MAYOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Karrow reported that Senator Booker has added Flemington Borough to be earmarked for two million plus dollars to finish the new Police building, now Flemington Borough is in the Congressional budget thanks to Congressman Kean and the Senate budget thanks to Senator Booker. The Mayor also reported that she received an email from a resident regarding parking space striping between 33-37 Mine Street, The Mayor reported the strips were not authorized by Ordinance on Mine Street nor was there a traffic study done to justify the stripes by the former Mayor. The Mayor has directed DPW to eliminate the striping since that is a major lawsuit if someone got hurt and the Mayor is also looking at the traffic study on Corcoran Street and North Place.

# **COUNCIL VICE PRESIDENT TILLY:**

Council Vice President Tilly reported that on April 18, 2023 a DPW meeting was held and they discussed the requirements for lead & galvanized water pipes and the flooding issues for residents near 5 Academy Street and the town wide yard sale is May 6 & 7, 2023

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# **COUNCILMAN PARKER:**

Councilman Parker reported that the NJEDA is posting a grant outreach tomorrow and Councilman Parker is encouraging the Spanish and Latinos to be more involved and organizing an outreach with the Mayor and Council with the Spanish and Latino communities.

## **COUNCILWOMAN ENGLEHARDT:**

3. ORDINANCE 2023-16: REPEALING ORDINANCE 2020-2 CONCERNING SECTION 2610, 2611, AND 2641 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF FLEMINGTON RELATED TO THE MIXED-USE MULTI-FAMILY OVERLAY DISTRICT

**WHEREAS**, the Borough Council of the Borough of Flemington approved Ordinance No. 2020-2 on July 13, 2020 concerning the mixed-use multi-family overlay district as found in Sections 2610, 2611, and 2641 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Flemington; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council now seeks to repeal that ordinance and restore the prior language.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Common Council of the Borough Flemington, in the County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, that Ordinance No. 2020-2 is hereby repealed and the language contained in Section 2610, 2611, and 2641 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Flemington shall be restored to the language contained therein prior to the adoption of Ordinance No. 2020-2.

SECTION I. If any part of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance.

SECTION II. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, or clause of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reasons, the remaining portions of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect and, to this end, the provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared severable.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall take effect upon adoption and publication in the manner required by New Jersey general law.

WHEREAS Hunterdon Helpline has requested moving the Salsa Night event from Stangl Road to Fulper Road from Central Avenue to Main Street for September 23, 2023, from 4:00 PM to 10:00 PM for Salsa Night; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Emergency Management's (OEM) 2004 Dodge Durango sustained damage during a vehicular accident; and

WHEREAS, the Borough's insurance company declared the vehicle a total loss and paid the Borough \$3,900.00 for the vehicle; and

WHEREAS, the loss of this vehicle creates an emergent need to acquire a new one to replace it; and

WHEREAS, the OEM will share a replacement vehicle with the Office of Code Enforcement and Property Maintenance; and

WHEREAS, the OEM solicited multiple vendors for quotes for a replacement vehicle with the necessary specifications; and

**WHEREAS**, Royll Emergency Vehicles provided a quote for a 2014 Ford Explorer for \$8,750.00, which was the only quote for a vehicle that met all necessary specifications; and

**WHEREAS**, the Chief Financial Officer certifies that funds are available for this purchase in the 2023 Borough budget and from the money the insurance company refunded the Borough.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Flemington, County of Hunterdon, State of New Jersey, that the Chief Financial Officer be authorized to issue a purchase order to Royll Emergency Vehicles in the amount of \$8,750 for the purchase of a 2014 Ford Explorer.

## 6. RESOLUTION 2023-103: SUPPORTING THE FLEMINGTON COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP NEIGHBORHOOD PRESERVATION PROGRAM GRANT AND IMPLEMENTATION PLAN, 2023

**WHEREAS** the Flemington Community Partnership (FCP) in the Borough of Flemington was designated a Neighborhood Preservation Program district and awarded a grant in 2021 from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Neighborhood Preservation Program (NPP); and

**WHEREAS** the FCP has taken public input including resident and business feedback sessions, and input from a community Stakeholder Committee comprised of Flemington Borough residents, business owners, property owners and select municipal officials; and

**WHEREAS** the FCP has taken public feedback and desired objectives as noted in the application and combined them with the recommendations to provide a 2023 Implementation Plan related to the grant; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Flemington wishes to continue receiving technical assistance and funding through the NPP program for the FCP and continue the partnership with the programs administered by the FCP.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Flemington, Hunterdon County, New Jersey:

- authorizes an NPP application for grant funding in the amount of \$125,000 and will contribute a municipal match of \$25,000 in 2023; and
- recognizes and accepts that the Department may offer a lesser or greater amount and therefore, upon receipt of the grant agreement from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, does further authorize the execution of any such grant agreement; and also, upon receipt of the fully executed agreement from the Department, does further authorize advance of such funds to the Flemington Community Partnership and the expenditure of funds pursuant to the terms of the agreement; and

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• Authorizes the acceptance of the Flemington Community Partnership 2023 Implementation Plan.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that Mayor and Acting Borough Clerk are authorized to sign the application on behalf of the Borough of Flemington, and any other documents necessary in connection therewith.

Robin Lapidus from Flemington Community Partnership gave a brief synopsis of the resolution.

**WORK SESSION:** BOROUGH ENGINEER WILL DISCUSS THE NJ REQUIREMENTS FOR LEAD & GALVANIZED WATER PIPES AND THE FLOODING ISSUES FOR RESIDENTS AT ACADEMY STREET

# THE NJ REQUIREMENTS FOR LEAD & GALVANIZED WATER PIPES

Terry Vogt, Borough Engineer from Remington & Vernick discussed the new law that came out that all NJ Municipalities as of July 2021who has a public community water system has to inventory and replace lead service lines within ten years or approximately summer of 2031. An inventory and certification is required by summer of 2023 certifying that there was an inventory and a plan to have the work done.

Mayor Karrow stated the residents who signed up for emails from the Borough are periodically receiving emails from the Borough asking to do a pipe inventory and identify and let the town know what our water lines are and very few people have responded to the survey. Mayor Karrow stated the NJDEP is telling the water department that they need to know who has lead & galvanized water pipes even though the water department cannot go onto private property, can the water department find out what residents who have not responded to the survey have without going on private property. Mr. Vogt stated that would be hard to find out without using some form of technology to find out. Mayor Karrow asked how to the Borough get guidance on this. Mr. Vogt's recommendation is to make the best assessment that the Borough can based on the information they have received.

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# FLOODING ISSUES FOR RESIDENTS AT ACADEMY STREET

Mayor Karrow stated the Borough has \$1.7 million dollars sitting in NJDOT iBank to complete work of Academy Street and paving of Bloomfield Avenue and the Borough will not use the money until the budget is passed.

Mayor Karrow explained the flooding on Academy Street.

Councilwoman Englehardt suggested a tour of the area with the DPW Director, Mike Campion.

Borough Engineer, Terry Vogt explained the improvements that needs to be done on Academy Street to address the flooding.

# PULIC COMMENTS – SESSION II:

Maureen Keelen from Flemington Borough is asking why Councilman Malik Johnston has a highprofile Attorney and she cannot get one.

Caitlin Giles-McCormick from Flemington Borough wanted to understand the commitment level of the Borough to participant in the complete street project on Academy Street. Mayor Karrow explained the Grant the Borough received. Ms. Giles-McCormick stated she wants justification when having the Public Hearing for the budget. Mayor Karrow stated the CFO has been to every meeting when the Council is discussing the budget.

Ms. Giovanni from Flemington Borough stated she did not receive an email regarding replacing the lead pipes in their homes. Administrator Humphrey stated the emails went out to targeted roads.

Todd Cook from Flemington Borough hoped the Council all sat down together and went over the budget. Mr. Cook stated the Borough needs to be redeveloped instead of the taxpayers paying the taxes for empty lots.
